

ADVANCED PLACEMENT ENGLISH COMES TO ST. JOSEPH HIGH SCHOOL

After spending the summer at the Advanced Placement (AP) Summer Institute in English Literature and Composition, Ms. Turman, English Department Chair, came back excited to implement an AP program at St. Joseph High School.

She incorporated more literary theory, so that our students now have the ability to conduct analysis using Marxist, Feminist, Psychoanalytic theories and New Historicism. Student projects linked technology with learning. Whether designing mixtapes covers for the texts that we read, turning novels into Twitter conversations or thinking about how issues posed in 19th and 20th century literature are applicable in today's society, and posed solutions as to how they and their peers could create change.

Implementing AP classes at SJHS not only prepares our students for college courses, but it also shows colleges that they are more than ready for college-level work. This year, for the first time in SJHS history 14 students took the AP English Literature exam and, 13 students took the AP English Language exam in June.

Judge Chin also discussed his experience of being the first Asian American judge to be appointed to the Second Circuit. Impressed with the SJHS students, Judge Chin invited them to visit his courtroom at the United States Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit.

TAKE FIRST PLACE IN OWL POETRY SLAM COMPETITION

Simone Waugh from Generation Verb worked with some of our 9th grade class in a spoken word poetry workshop in which students learn the many elements of the craft, and perform compositions of their own. The students started first by reading unpunctuated versions of a poem on their iPads, knowing nothing yet about the poet – no race, gender, or any aspects of the authors biography – or the bodily and vocal gestures the author would use in the performance. Their first task was to take some guesses about how the poem would sound when performed, who its speaker would be, how the syntax would flow, etc.

Next, they watched the performance, while listening for punctuation pauses and marking them on their versions. The second time through, they listened for changes in inflection – the pitch of a speaker's voice rising and falling – and marked words and phrases where they heard such changes.



After reviewing a fully punctuated version of the poem and making comparisons to their own markings, they watched the performance again, this time observing aspects of body language including posture, facial expressions, mimicry, and the other ways the author used his limbs to shape pieces of the poem on the stage.

All of this work led up to a Poetry Slam in which each school performed their own works using their own style. SJHS took 1st place their very first time in the competition.

SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

Integrated Project: World of 7 Billion

As part of their annual integrated project, the freshwomen competed in the "World of 7 Billion" video contest. In teams of three or four, the girls tackled environmental and social justice issues relating to the advancement of women and girls, feeding 7 billion people, and pollution. They identified the problem or issue that they wanted to focus on, gathered current data and research on their issue and developed a sustainable solution. As part of their research, they had the opportunity to visit the United Nations to learn more about the UN Sustainable Development Goals, which tackle the same issues facing today's world. Finally they let their creativity flow as they created, starred in, directed and edited a one-minute movie, using our recording studio and film production resources, to share the issue and potential solutions.



Fischer Scientific Partnership

In partnership with Fischer Scientific, one of our country's leading lab and hospital supply companies, DNA analysis was brought to life in the SJHS classroom. Their program, "Innovation Nation" cultivates student interest in STEM fields by bringing professional equipment and procedures into the classroom. As we finished our unit on DNA, they brought DNA samples to analyze using gel electrophoresis. This is the same procedure used by forensics lab technicians and geneticists to compare DNA found at crime scenes, test for genetic abnormalities and determine family relationships. Our students loved the hands-on, real-life experience that this partnership provided. Hopefully, we have inspired some future forensic analysts and geneticists.

COLLEGE PREPARATION

AND PLACEMENT PROGRAM EXPANSION

It is a continuous and consistent process which is built upon the basis of frequent, accumulated personal contact between advisor and advisee. Mr. Giordano came to SJHS from The Theatre Arts Production Company School with about six years experience as the Director of the College Center. As Director of the College Center, Mr. Giordano provided a variety of college counseling services including admissions and placement, scholarships and financial aid.

Since coming to SJHS, Mr. Giordano has worked with each junior and senior on a variety of college related endeavors including preparation/registration for the PSAT and SAT, college applications, financial aid, scholarships, and a variety of enrichment programs. Under the guidance of the college office every senior has taken the SAT, applied to college, and been accepted to college. Students have received millions of dollars in scholarships, grants, and nominations for a variety of highly competitive scholarships. We have had a finalist for the Posse Foundation scholarship. Every student also receives personalized assistance with the writing of a college essay. Each essay is critiqued and edited on an individual basis. Freshwomen and sophomores also receive information

through presentations regarding the college search process.

The college office provides students with access to a personalized website dedicated to posting information covering all aspects of the college admissions process. In-class presentations are provided to all students on a variety of topics including the financial aid process, the college admissions process, preparing for the PSAT, and understanding PSAT results. Each senior meets individually several times during the year to develop a plan to meet her needs. Each student is also provided with one-on-one assistance with the FAFSA, CSS Profile, and completion of the commonapp, SUNY app, and CUNY app. Parent Information nights are held regarding the financial aid process and the college application process for both juniors and seniors.

FULL STEAM AHEAD



1:1 IPAD PROGRAM

One of our major goals at ST. Joseph High School is to foster a strong cross curricular focus on innovative STEAM education by successfully implementing a schoolwide I to I iPad program. Every student and teacher is now equipped with their own device. By integrating Apple TVs into each classroom projector, students and teachers can broadcast what they write on their iPads directly onto screens to truly create a collaborative learning environment.

Teachers can distribute digital worksheets where students can fill out labs, draw graphs and submit quizzes or tests, without the needless waste of

paper. Research has also shown that the action of writing by hand allows your brain to better process and retain information, making the right type of iPad integration truly offer the best of both worlds.

From a teacher standpoint, there are numerous benefits of incorporating this technology into the classroom; from increased control over the content that students are accessing through the use of Apple Classroom, to seamless delivery of course materials and access to vastly wider and more interactive array of available content.

GEOMETRY

In Geometry class with Ms. Hu, students learn to utilize graphing apps that show students the relationship between formulas and shapes. By changing values on the fly, they are able to see how a shape scales, or they see how changes to functions affect trigonometric graphs. Students are able to draw onto their iPads and can engage in a variety of apps that Ms. Hu introduces with each topic.

SCIENCE

By implementing apps like Kahoot, Science Department Chair Mrs. Barron can turn her class on the study of cells, biodiversity and climate change into a game show. Questions are broadcast onto the board and each student's iPad receives multiple choices to choose their answer. Sometimes students are put into groups to discuss their answers while engaging in friendly competition with the rest of the class for the highest score. Students in all sciences also complete and submit all of their required Regents labs via Notability and Google Classroom.

HISTORY

In Government and Economics 12, where students are studying different conceptions of human rights, Mr. Kallo can ask students to research several different news articles by accessing content approved websites. Students learn how to research different sources of information and see how each provides a different viewpoint. After reading these articles, students can share their findings in Google Docs in order to collaboratively discuss and provide critical analysis on each others opinions.

ENGLISH

In Ms. Turman's English class, students can find all of their books and reading materials on their iPads. Allowing them to highlight and make annotations all throughout their digital texts. Whether it is recreating famous scenes or creating video infomercials on real world issues, it is all done using the iPad.



LAUNCH OF FAB LAB CURRICULUM

From the first day of class, students are encouraged to start thinking of themselves as makers and inventors, not just consumers of products and goods. This can be an exhilarating, but also an intimidating idea. Some students are sure that their creativity cannot extend to the realms of science, technology, engineering and math, and hesitate to connect them to their interest in arts such as drawing and storytelling. As young women, they have often assimilated the idea that such activities are "for boys," causing them not to even consider if they might have interests and talents of their own that could grow and flourish in one of the many STEM fields.


By starting out with fundamentals, our students gradually gain confidence and skill, utilizing all these tools and many others to both design and fabricate their own creations. In the ongoing, deeply collaborative process, they also learn crucial communication skills and develop lasting bonds of friendship with their classmates.

Our FabLab students learn that their ability to create using increasingly complex tools is what allows the human species to survive and thrive in the world. Gaining a rich understanding about the properties and potentialities of natural and synthetic materials, students learn how to design and fabricate objects that will be functional and durable. In this way, they begin to see the important connections between manual and digital tools, and to understand that even the most sophisticated digital creation depends on a highly developed understanding of the material, concrete world. Before designing prototypes on the computer, they learn to design by hand, and after designing on the computer, they learn how to test their projects out in the real world. At a time when employers are reporting a dearth of qualified candidates for skilled design and manufacturing, particularly in male-dominated fields of work, this kind of knowledge provides SJHS students with a much-needed skill-set that will benefit them in their future careers and beyond.

SUCCESSFUL IMPLEMENTATION OF ELECTRONICS, CIRCUITRY AND CODING INTO 9TH GRADE PRINCIPLES OF TECHNOLOGY.


The Technology Fundamentals class provided all 9th grade students an overview of multimedia applications, digital citizenship, sewable technology, coding, robotics, circuitry and electronics. The express intent was to expose the students to opportunities in the various fields of technology. Over the past year students, by learning the basic concepts and theories governing the field of computer science, robotics, electrical and electronic engineering, were able to complete individual lab assignments and team projects given to reinforce each lesson. These activities, while hands on were done in conjunction with Apple, Google and Microsoft applications which helped to strengthen the core concepts of each lesson taught. By engaging the students with this approach, it produced a highly favorable result.





IMPLEMENTATION OF ROBOTICS PROGRAM

Many students who start out in the Tech Fundamentals class also join the Robotics Club, a partnership with NYU Tandon School of Engineering where students can keep exploring their interests in engineering and computer science through fun activities and challenges. In the Robotics Club, Ms. Green has seen one hour meetings easily turn into two and half hours. Once the students get engrossed in the projects, she observes eyes brighten and minds engage – ideas flow back and forth across the room, and students share what they have figured out with one another, generating a dynamic – maybe even an electric – atmosphere. This year the SJHS team placed 3rd at the NYU ITEST Innovention Competition.



SUCCESSFUL IMPLEMENTATION OF ENGINEERING COURSE

This new course, available to sophomores has three main tenets common to all fields of engineering: Communication, Collaboration, and Iteration. This structure encourages students to consistently refine their work as they study free-hand and technical drawing, and try out the processes of engineering design. Visual, written and oral communication allow students to share their ideas and findings. The focus on collaboration and iteration forms an environment where the major aspects of any engineering endeavor are gradually learned by osmosis.

One of the outcomes of this class is that it is applicable to many other fields of study; academic research of all kinds depends on the same method of collecting information, finding and posing a problem, suggesting a hypothesis or plan, testing out that hypothesis in relation to the real-world constraints, refining the original plan, and then repeating the iterative process several times until the best possible approximation is reached.

In Engineering class, students discover that existing within space and time, and by extension engaging in activities such as designing buildings and objects, is fundamentally, and literally "hands-on". Students were hands on in the woodshop, not only learning measurement and technical drawing, but also applying their skills to a variety of school wide projects such as building desks, coasters, etc.

ALUMNAE SPOTLIGHTS



LAURE Raymond

SJHS class of 2014 Laure Raymond graduated from Barnard where she was a Biology major. When asked why she chose that major, she replied, "Because I love Biology!" In June, she headed off to Liberia to volunteer with the Peace Corps for 2 years as a high school science teacher where she will be able to share her passion for Biology with her students.

Laure's interest in the Peace Corps began in her junior year at SJHS, in Mr. Cooke's Business Class. Having been assigned a "5 year plan" project, she began to research what she might do with her interests in science, medicine, and humanitarian aid work. In the process, she came across the Peace Corps website and was immediately drawn to the mission: to bring trained volunteers to communities worldwide in need of assistance and to improve the relationship between Americans and people in served communities.

Before Laure entered high school, she considered herself to be a solitary, quiet person, reading and studying on her own. But upon entering the tight-knit SJHS community things began to change.

For the first time she made friends - her "family away from family". Her friends would push each other to go above and beyond in their classes and other activities. Just for fun they would debate all kinds of topics together, and they challenged each other to be "strivers," seeking to learn and grow as people as well as students. For Laure, this social growth was the most significant and lasting aspect of her time at SJHS. Laure will tell you, "You're not made to be rigid! You're made to grow."

"It's fascinating to see how a tiny baby could grow into anything - you never know what will happen in the future. And we all started at that point!" A freshman at St. Peter's University, Genelle Sonson (SJHS '17) aspires to be a neonatal nurse.

When Genelle came to St. Joseph's she initially found much to complain about, and struggled to find her path. But several things happened during her senior year that changed her perspective. She took a risk and tried a new sport. Having participated in dance for the previous three years, senior year found Genelle discovering how much she enjoyed running. With a new sport came a new coach, and she flourished under Coach Akil's guidance. "Don't let anyone count you out," he repeatedly told her, pushing her to grow in

dedication, discipline, and determination through rigorous daily training.

While school was becoming more exciting, tuition was becoming a serious financial challenge. With four siblings and increasing costs, it became almost impossible to make ends meet. St. Joseph High School worked with a fellow alumna, Dr. Joan Tansey '54 to award Genelle with a full tuition scholarship to get her through senior year.

But then, another obstacle presented itself; a hand injury she received while running turned into a serious infection, and suddenly Genelle was in the hospital on the verge of losing her left hand, missing classes and wondering if she would ever be able to run again. The healing and recovery process was lengthy, and her hospital was so far from school that it was difficult for friends to visit. The day she was to be discharged, she heard a knock at the door. She expected to see a nurse walk in, but instead it was Principal Latham, carrying balloons! Genelle was truly surprised and

moved. She recalls this day as her best memory from high school because it was the moment she realized that SJHS is far more than just a school it's a community of people who care about you.

As she prepares for a career as a neonatal nurse, she remains convinced that SJHS offers students an opportunity to discover their own potential the way that she did. She advises current students to take advantage of all the resources available to them, and most importantly to discover the teachers whose classes they find both challenging and interesting, and foster a relationship with them. "The high expectations at SJHS lay a foundation for the rest of your life," she explains. "Don't take anything for granted; embrace it all!"

I have been involved at St. Joseph High School for close to 20 years serving on the board, working in college counseling, development and school advancement. During this time I have worked closely with students in groups and individually. Ten years ago, I started working one on one with students and found it to be enormously rewarding. I feel that I have made a life-changing difference in my mentees' lives and they in mine.

My first mentee was a recent immigrant from China. She arrived at St. Joseph speaking very little English and her parents did not speak any English at all. She was ambitious, determined and hard working. While she was willing to put in the hours



necessary to be successsful academically, she needed someone to help advocate for her and navigate the college process. She started college at BMCC and graduated from Baruch college with a degree in finance several years ago. We remain friends, celebrating the Chinese New Year and St. Patrick's Day on a regular basis.

The mentorship program is growing. We have four mentors in the program working with and supporting students. The program consists of providing guidance and helping a student with the challenges of high school and planning for her future. All of the students in the program are on substantial scholarship and contributing financial support is also part of the commitment.




